As a result we have redesigned our project into phases.

Phase One will be a 40,000 square foot aquarium and museum.

Phase Two will be a major expansion including, a Butterfly Atrium Discovery Center, River Walk, Aviary, Nature Trails, and an Environmental Research and Scientific Center

Lynn stressed very strongly that in order to fundraise, we first need to "Friendraise." She said, "There are four P's that I follow.


Product is what you have to offer.
